Advent

Do you find the days leading up to Christmas as harried and confusing as I often do?

I heard about a little boy—exhausted after a hard day of Christmas shopping filled with rush and stress—choosing to use the Lord's prayer as a bedtime prayer, but with one notable change: "And forgive us our *Christmases* as we forgive those who *Christmas* against us."

Sometimes the commotion is so great that there is little way to focus upon the Christ child. Any readiness we might find for His coming gets crowded out by all the baggage we add to the season.

Have you ever found yourself snowbound on some cold winter day when the electricity goes down? It's amazing what you can hear when all the usual buzzing and humming of things around the house are silenced. The constant background noise of furnaces, refrigerators, radios, and televisions, all strangely gone, leaving you to hear what you might rarely notice on other days. Like the occasional groan of the roof under a thick blanket of snow. The brush of an ice-laden tree limb against a window pane. The gentle crackle of a log burning in a fireplace. Emergency Pendants

CVM offers personal emergency response pendants for residents in the Garden Homes and in all areas of the healthcare center.

Regardless of age or health, these devices really can be lifesaving. In the event of an injury or other emergency, the button on the device is pressed and the staff from the facility is alerted to send help immediately. Having a personal pendant is sometimes better than just simply dialing 9-1-1, because a phone is not always readily available in the event of an emergency.

Garden Home residents' security panels are set up with an option to have a pendant that can be pushed in the event of an emergency. The pendant works like the pull cords in the home and will alert someone in the main building that you need assistance. The device works within the boundaries of the Garden Home.

If you reside in the main building, you also have the option of using a pendant at an additional cost. These pendants work just as your emergency pull cords in the apartments or rooms would work, alerting staff you need assistance. These pendants will work anywhere within the main building and have a location sensor, to alert staff of the area in which you are closest.


