## A New and Improved Pavilion

CVM has a long-standing reputation as one of Cincinnati's finest Life Plan Communities. From the beautiful scenery to the award-winning healthcare, it is a very special place that about 450 residents call home. Our community is situated on 75-acres of immaculately manicured grounds and features amenities such as the Renewal Fitness Center, Matthew's Dining Room, the Stone Worship Center & Auditorium, a large woodworking shop, and a picnic pavilion.

The picnic pavilion is one amenity that is used often in the warmer months. It is a place for a vast array of activities and events including cookouts, ice cream socials, and concerts. The management team recognizes that our residents deserve only the very best, and we have thought for some time that the picnic pavilion could be enhanced to create a better atmosphere and a more useable space.

If you attended the January 26 meeting hosted in the Stone Center about the upgrades planned to the pavilion, you will recall that it was shared that the existing pavilion does not have an ideal design. There are no restrooms and no kitchen for meal preparation, so it's really limited to be used for picnics. In addition, the pavilion has storage that the community desperately needs, but the storage is limited and not water-tight or climate controlled. To resolve these design dilemmas, we partnered with an architectural firm to look at the existing pavilion and help us brainstorm ideas on how we could improve it. Our goal was to create a new pavilion that was beautiful, functional, provides restrooms, and a limited kitchen. After months of research and hard work, the final design is one that we can be very proud of.

The new pavilion will be about 3,600 sq. ft. which is much larger than the existing pavilion. It will have a beautiful gas fireplace creating a fireside lounge area, kitchen serving space and the much-needed addition of restrooms!

An added benefit is that there will also be an additional 3,500 sq. ft. for storage and 48 parking spaces. Our timeline is to start construction late spring or early summer of 2023 with completion in fall of 2023, meaning the pavilion will be out of commission through the end of the year.

We are thrilled to get this project underway. Our residents deserve the very best, and the new pavilion is sure to provide that.

#### **Christian Village Comfort Care Update**

In the November 2022 newsletter, I reported that our application for Christian Village Hospice was submitted to the Ohio Department of Health and there is at least a 60-day waiting period prior to surveyors granting approval to begin enrolling patients in our Comfort Care program.

We are currently still waiting for our initial survey. Upon a successful survey, we will be able to provide services to a limited number of patients. The Ohio Department of Health will return to review charts and watch patient care before providing us with our license.

We welcomed Nikkia Strickland, STNA (State Tested Nursing Assistant) in January. Nikkia has over 20 years of experience as an aide, which include many years with various hospice agencies. Nikkia has been working with Ashli Gordon, Hospice Clinical Director, and has been learning about our Mason and Mt. Healthy campuses.

We continue to work on our program structure and outline of programs Comfort Care will offer. Specific programs will include volunteer services, grief support and bereavement.

We look forward to our start up and continuing to fulfill the mission of Christian Village Communities to our residents and their families.

#### **Prioritizing Heart Health**

A recent morning devotion reminded me of something important. If my heart has bitterness and unforgiveness, it isn't a good home for the Holy Spirit. A goal of keeping my heart healthy begins with letting go of disappointments and hurts. Here are three additional ways I can prioritize heart health:

- 1. Exercise walking frequently, even if for small amounts of time, because it all adds up!
- 2. Dental care visiting the dentist and keeping up on recommended care, including flossing. Research indicates that bacteria present in gum disease can travel throughout the body triggering inflammation in the heart's vessels and infection in heart valves.
- 3. Hydrating keeping the body hydrated makes it easier for the heart to pump blood through the blood vessels to the muscles, thereby helping our muscles work efficiently.

February was declared American Heart Month back in 1964 and continues today as a month when people focus on their cardiovascular health. On March 19, Cincinnati will celebrate 46 years of fighting heart disease and stroke with six running and walking events held downtown Cincinnati. Our Christian Village at Mason team will once again participate "virtually" with an event one month later (warmer weather please) on our beautiful grounds. # You Never Know

#### PATTERNS FOR PRAISE

God, in His infinite wisdom and love, has given us patterns for that which He would have us do. We have been given a pattern for prayer, a pattern for the church, and patterns for praise.

Most of these patterns for praise are in the Old Testament. One of the oldest is in the book of Isaiah, in Chapter 6. Isaiah was ushered into the presence of God, and the seraphim cried, "Holy, holy, holy is the Lord Almighty; the whole earth is full of his glory." When we come into the presence of God we recognize His holiness, His power, and His glory. In the presence of God we are aware of our sinfulness. We can never see ourselves as we need to until we stand before God. We cry out for forgiveness as did Isaiah. We are forgiven, cleansed, and made whole. He restores our soul. Then in answer to God's question "Whom shall I send?" we answer, as Isaiah did, "Here am I. Send me." And we get out of our places of praise and into the world with the message of God's love. Praise culminates in service. Paul reminds us of this in Romans 12. "Offer your bodies as living sacrifices, holy and pleasing to God--which is your spiritual worship."

Most of our patterns for praise can be found in the book of Psalms. In fact, the book has been given the subtitle "Patterns for Praise," and was known to the Hebrews as the book of praises.

The Psalms not only reveal God to us but also conduct us into His very presence. They present the exalted majesty of God, helping us to know that He is great but near. The psalms are songs that come from the soul of the worshiper. They give us words to express the feelings of our hearts--the words that we cannot find.

Sometimes we simply cannot find the words to express our questions or our praises to God. At those times we can just borrow the words of the psalmist. We can pray the same words that are on the page of the Bible before us. What better words of praise than the familiar passage from Psalm 8:

"O Lord, our Lord, how majestic is your name in all the earth! . . . . When I consider the heavens, the work of your fingers, the moon and the stars, which you have set in place, what is man that you are mindful of him."

Or:

"Many, O Lord my God, are the wonders you have done.

The things you planned for us no one can recount to

Were I to tell of them, they would be too many to declare." (Psalm 40:5)

Then there is Psalm 71:19-24 and Psalm 89:1,2,14,15. and many other passages. Often a psalm written in the third person can be changed to second person, addressing God as we make it our prayer to Him.

The language of these words works for us today even though we live on this side of the cross. They are indeed patterns for praise.
