

A MESSAGE FROM THE CEO Larry Monroe



This will be my last Connection article as President and CEO. As announced in early August, I am retiring at year-end. I ask your indulgence as this article will be different from others. I have some reflections I would like to share.

People retire for many different reasons. Some retire earlier than others, again, for many different reasons. The decision to retire was not an easy one for me to make. Serving as CEO of Christian Village Communities has been the most rewarding twelve years of my working life. Having a role in the development and growth of our leadership team has been a joy. I once told the Board of Directors that one of the best gifts I can give them is the gift of succession. I considered it to be one of my primary responsibilities to build a team that could carry on well in my absence. I am pleased to say, mission accomplished on this front. What brought me to the conclusion that I should retire was pondering how important the future years will be for my sweet bride Kathy and me. With God's blessing, we want to make those years the very best they can be.

Christian Village Communities has become such a key part of my life. I feel fortunate to have finished my working years loving what I do. I have seen mission expansion for CVC. For instance, the adding of Christian Village Hospice to our continuum of care has been a huge blessing to our residents, their families and our team members.

I'm pleased that CVC continues its commitment to providing financial subsidy for qualifying residents in our healthcare centers. Benevolent care was at the heart of our ministry when it began in 1960 under the name of The Christian Benevolent Association of Greater Cincinnati (CBA). I am thankful for the donors who stand with us in financial support, making it possible for the life changing mission of financial benevolence to continue. There is much more work to be done on this front, and more donors will be needed in the future to sustain this critical aspect of the CVC ministry.

I have been asked what I consider to be a crowning achievement for my tenure as CEO. When I interviewed for the job with the search committee of the Board of Directors in the summer of 2012 my background included no experience in our industry. I offered a Christian faith since the age of 10, life-long affiliation with our founding church movement, fundraising experience and my general business leadership and management experience. I believe what uniquely equipped me to lead CVC at this time in our history has been the combination of those attributes.

When I think of achievements, my thoughts go to my team. I owe so much gratitude to every team leader who patiently helped their boss learn the fundamentals of our business. Together we learned how to best lead CVC to some of the finest outcomes of our 60-plus year history. God blessed our commitment to Him, to each other, our unwavering focus on running the business with world-class excellence, and a whole lot of hard work!

The late Almond (Bud) Smith served CBA as its first finance manager in the early years of our ministry. The money had to be raised to build the organization, and to construct our first retirement community, The Christian Village at Mt. Healthy. I recall Bud telling me, "Here I was with all those preachers, sharing their grand dreams of what CBA was going to be and do, and what they wanted to build, and it was left to me to remind them that we had 500 bucks in the checking account! Well, those preachers taught me a thing or two about faith, and I taught them a thing or two about finances and together we made a great team." A book could be written about this basic premise, and perhaps there has been. I consider among my most cherished achievements as CEO to be leaving CVC on solid financial footing, with a very bright future. What I'm particularly proud of is that this happened not at the cost of, but in tandem with considerable mission expansion.

I want to share a few words about our incoming CEO, Vickie Brashear. Very early in my tenure at CVC as I was building my team, I knew that I needed a very talented CFO to help me accomplish the task set before me. I prayed fervently that God would reveal to us an extraordinary finance mind and leader. From the day I first had lunch with Vickie, I sensed her heart for the Lord. I could tell she had a close relationship with Jesus.

Being successful in financial management alone was not enough for Vickie. She needed to serve a ministry where her gifts and abilities would advance a cause bigger than her own needs for career success, and she had a passion for serving others in Jesus' name. Vickie's succeeding me as CEO following her ten years of exemplary service to CVC as our CFO is exciting and gives me peace of mind knowing we will be in very good hands as I leave my post.

Although my time as CEO ends on December 31, 2024, at the request of the Board of Directors and Vickie I will continue to serve on a part-time basis throughout 2025. I will assist with specific projects, including our capital projects, editing our publications, helping with fundraising and whatever else Vickie asks me to do! All this is to say, I will be around for another year following my CEO departure, and I look forward to seeing some of you in the future.

Thank you for the prayers and encouragement that undergirded my leadership, brightened this CEO's path and lightened the load. I will leave my post with a prayer in my heart that the support afforded me will continue for Vickie, her team, our residents and patients, and our Board of Directors.

God's hand has been upon the ministry of Christian Village Communities since its beginning. I have witnessed Him move in ways that have literally taken me to my knees. I believe if the leadership at CVC always puts God first, if we run our business in ways that honor Him and point others to Jesus, He will continue His blessings upon our labors.

Extraordinary End-of-Life Care

Christian Village Hospice provides services for a patient and their family when there is a terminal diagnosis and a projected life expectancy of six months or less. Care includes visits from nursing staff, a Social Worker and a Chaplain. Additionally, ongoing education is provided regarding the disease, end-of-life process and medications.

However, it is important to also know that hospice provides additional support in a variety of ways to help benefit the patients and their families. The care provided is unique and individual, therefore it's critical that the hospice team learn about our patients. Knowing their history, personal likes and dislikes or little things that bring them joy helps provide better care and build special bonds between the patient and hospice team members.

Celebrating our patients and their special events is important, whether it be a birthday, anniversary or other special event. Our team provides a birthday "sweet" treat and a card signed by all the team members. Similarly, on wedding anniversaries we help the patient and spouse (if living) to celebrate their special day.

Honoring our veterans is also important to our team. Veterans receive recognition through a certificate and a commemorative coin presented with their family present on Veteran's Day. Volunteers provide remarkable benefit to our hospice program. We currently have 16 trained volunteers. The volunteers provide pet visits, read Scripture and daily devotions, listen to music, take residents on walks and assist with activities they enjoy. It is remarkable to watch the bond that builds between the volunteer, the patient, and their family, and it truly benefits the patient's overall well-being.

CVH provides bereavement services for the patient's families with cards, letters and phone calls throughout 13 months following their loved one's passing. This also includes grief support groups, 1:1 grief counseling, and Memorial Services. We also send handwritten cards to families to recognize the first birthday, anniversary and Christmas since their loved one's passing. It is important that we acknowledge to our families that these "Firsts" can be difficult days and that our team continues to remain supportive of them as needed.

"Moments to Remember" was created by CVH to support the staff in our communities. Our staff develop deeply meaningful relationships with our patients. MTR provides them with time to reflect and celebrate the life and memories of their patients for whom they have cared and to share memories with their teammates.

As CVH continues to flourish, we will build upon these benefits and make the hospice experience extraordinary for our patients and families and team members.





One worthy CBAF cause is renewable college scholarships for high school seniors working part-time in our dining room. A Special Opportunity for those 70 1/2 and Older

Act Soon to receive potential 2024 tax benefits

When you are 70 $\frac{1}{2}$ or older, you are eligible to make a Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD) directly from your taxable IRA account to a tax-exempt charity like the CBA Foundation or Christian Village Communities up to \$105,000 annually.

If you are 73 or older, you must withdraw a specific amount from your IRA each year, called a Required Minimum Distribution (RMD). If you transfer all or a part of your RMD directly to a qualified charity like the CBA Foundation or CVC, the amount that is transferred may not be considered taxable income.

Getting To Know the New CEO

What an honor and a privilege it is for me to be selected by The Christian Village Communities' Board of Directors to serve as President/CEO following Larry's retirement. Serving as a CEO has never been a career goal of mine, but sometimes God has another plan for us.

When I first graduated from college, I had an interview scheduled with Community Mutual Insurance Company, now Anthem, to be a Medicare auditor. I was young and the interview was in downtown Cincinnati on West 8th Street. This was before most people had cell phones. I couldn't find the location for the interview. I spent a lot of time looking and then finally gave up. I didn't have a phone so I couldn't call them. Back then if you missed an interview or were even late, your chance of getting the job was almost zero. I thought to myself that it wasn't meant to be. However, later I received a call from the HR Director, and she

asked me what happened. I explained that I couldn't find the office and that I didn't have a phone to call them. The HR Director said that it was a frequent problem for them because of where they are located and she wanted to reschedule my interview. I was amazed. I did get the job where I performed Medicare audits of skilled nursing facilities and hospitals and that is how my career began. God did have a plan.

I worked as a Medicare auditor for two years and then took the CPA exam. I passed the CPA exam on my first sitting and scored in the top 10%. Because of my high score I was recruited by General Electric Company in Evendale. While at GE, I completed their Corporate Financial Management Program. This is a two-and-a-half-year program that consists of graduate level classes and rotational job assignments. I had a promising career ahead of me at GE, but I couldn't stop thinking about my time as a Medicare Auditor.

After I was at GE for almost five years, I was contacted by my previous employer. They said they were starting a new unit that specialized in the audits of skilled nursing facilities and asked if I would be interested in coming back. I told them that I would pray about it and get back to them. I truly felt like this would be taking a huge step back in my career, but I felt that was the direction in which I should go. I worked as a Medicare Auditor for another eight years. God did have a plan.

I was then contacted by a friend from high school. She was working for a small skilled nursing home chain. They were looking for a Controller and she thought I might be interested. Again, I told her that I would pray about it and get back to her. I did agree to take the Controller position. I worked for the small nursing home chain for four years, but I started feeling like God had another plan for me. I began praying hard for God to lead me in a new direction.

Reading a local paper, I discovered an ad for a Controller at Cedar Village Retirement Community. When I read the job description, I felt drawn to the position. I applied and interviewed for the position. They were having financial struggles at the time and were not able to offer me what I was making so it would mean a cut in pay for me. Again, I said I would pray about it. I felt strongly that I should accept this job. God did have a plan.

I was at Cedar Village for eight years. During my tenure I was promoted to the Chief Financial Officer position. It was a great job, and the Cedar Village Board respected me and the work that I was doing. However, even though I liked my job, I was always thinking to myself how much more rewarding it would be for me to work for a Christian organization. At one point I even tried to see if Mason Christian Village was looking for a Chief Financial Officer. But at that time, it was not God's timing.

After eight years at Cedar Village my husband was eligible to retire from his job, but we were both still young. I agreed to semi-retire with him and start a private tax service from my home. This didn't last long for either one of us. My husband went back to work after one and a half years, and I went back to work after two years.

During those two years, one of the board members from Cedar Village reached out to me. He was on another board of a small not-for-profit that was struggling financially. They were not even sure they would be able to pay me for my time. I agreed to help. It was a lot of work, but we were able to save the organization, and it is still operating today.

It was after this that I was contacted by a recruiter about a CFO job at Christian Village Communities, where I began working in October of 2014. I don't even have the words to explain how rewarding it has been to work for such a wonderful spirit-filled Christian organization. It has been amazing!

When I was asked to consider the CEO position, I said I would need to pray about it. And like so many other times in my career, God confirmed that this is what He has planned for me. I am extremely excited about the future, and I have great confidence that God will continue to bless Christian Village Communities. God does have a plan!
